A number of residents have asked about the league helping to organise a council

collection of toxic waste. Things like old boat batteries, oil paint and other chemicals that should not be going in a garbage bin.

Council will not organise a collection on the island so we would like to see who is interested in helping and also in coordinating our own collection of waste either that volunteers take to the Council's Thornleigh depot or, if this is what people want, we hire a contractor to collect from the public wharf and

drop to Hornsby's recycling depot. We would also be interested in hearing whether people were interested in helping to organise and run a soft plastic collection to take to Council's Thornleigh depot on a semiregular basis.

You will have received from Council a flyer setting out what can be recycled in the bins on the island.

Someone recently pointed out to me the phenomenon of 'Wishcycling': the act of putting something in a recycling bin because you believe it \*should\* be recycled, not because it \*can\* be recycled. Apparently the most commonly wishcycled item is takeaway coffee cups. Whilst they cannot be recycled, the lids can, but remember that the

Depot Cafe does welcome you to byo cup. Their coffee cups can be composted or used for seedlings and planted direct into the ground (put a hole in the bottom to speed up composting).

Unique to Dangar Island is wishshedding - aka the 'Ferry Shed Boutique'. The ferry shed is a great resource for re-use, but it gets cluttered and stuff left too long invariably ends up in bins. If you leave stuff at the ferry shed, check back in a week to see if it has taken a bite. If not, you should either take it to Vinnies or bin it.

If you are interested in helping with a waste collection or in soft plastic recycling please get in touch.

## "How many species are on the island?"

This question was raised by a new resident last year. To answer her question, there were bird and plant species lists for Dangar Island, but no general fauna list including invertebrates, amphibians, reptiles, mammals, fishes, birds or crabs. So a list was collated with help from other residents and their observations both past and present. By the end of 2022 our fauna species list had grown to over 230 creatures. Several residents have enthusiastically become spotters. A 101 year old moth and butterfly enthusiast helped identify a few amazing moths photographed on Dangar Island.

Then another question was asked at a Dangar Island League meeting: "Can anyone be involved?" YES please! Join the Dangar Island Citizen Science project, currently being developed on the DIL website. Everyone can share their observations of the living world that flies, crawls, burrows or climbs on and around Dangar Island. To launch this Citizen Science project there will be a couple of painting exhibitions by island children.

The first is our installation of island creatures that live on and around our island, hanging in the Public Wharf shed. The second exhibition, of painted maps depicting local and imaginary creatures, will be held in the Dangar Island Depot from 17th March to 28th April.

All the art works were painted in workshops on the Bowlo verandah and under the shade of trees in the DIG. The children used a collection of animal paintings created specially for their use as reference material. Images of ancient European and Indian tribal maps were also provided to help the kids explore diverse map design.

Watch for updates of the Citizen Science site and how to use it. In the meantime start your own list ready to contribute. Looking forward to your participation in this project.

For the third mild summer running, the Dangar Brigade and community have been spared

exposure to the weather-driven bush fire risks that we are used to at this time of year. As autumn 2023 rolls in we are seeing a late summer spike in temperatures and a general drying out of our local bush surrounds.

We encourage all islanders to maintain their homes...

- Have at least 1-2m cleared area around your home
- Trim trees and shrubs that are next to or overhanging your home
- Clear all leaf litter & debris from under and around your home including roof and gutters
- Remove flammable materials from around the home (gas bottles, chemicals, petrol, etc)

Removing debris from close to your house and storing in a compressed pile reduces its ability to burn quickly due to lowered oxygen and higher moisture content. It can be used as garden mulch, or as a quick way to fill the green bin.

## Get in early with Winter preparations.

Whilst having an open fire or slow combustion heater in the home is a comfort on cold winter days and nights it is important to ensure that your fire is well maintained. To ensure your chimney is up to snuff book an inspection and or clean ahead of the Winter rush.


## Easter Film & Curry Night

## DiG my Fennel

Recently I was fortunate enough to be given 3 lovely bulbs of fennel from the DIG garden. Some people don't quite know what to do with fennel. I devised this delicious recipe. Try it!

2 large or 3 small fennel bulbs A few chopped tomatoes 125g tasty cheese Chopped basil, parsley or any other herb you have to hand 2 slices bread (I use wholemeal sourdough)

Cut fennel in half, cut out the

cores and slice thinly.

Sauté fennel in a large pan with 2 tablespoons olive oil. Cook about 15 minutes until it is soft and slightly browned here and there.

Put a layer of cooked fennel in a medium sized baking dish and layer it with tomatoes, cheese,



herbs. Make 2 or 3 layers, finishing with cheese.

Break up the bread into small pieces, rub between your hands and put in a dish. Add a good slurp of olive oil, mix around and let stand for 5 mins. Then sprinkle on top of the fennel mixture.

Bake in 175°C oven until browned nicely (~ 40 – 45 mins).

You can add anything you like to this recipe. Bocconcini are also delicious snuggled between the layers!





## After The Deluge

After torrential rain the mountains glisten. On the sandstone escarpments orange flakes of iron ore rust in the sun. The river turns a dirty milk from the runoff. When the tide comes up from Broken Bay, a translucent layer of saltwater floats on top of the fresh from the rain. Powerful eddies form and draw shoals of mullet into spiralling pockets of tide. Mulloway, wolves of the river, circle these trapped schools of fish, picking off the stragglers with precision teamwork. After dusk in the still air, a full moon reflects across the river as it moves between the mountains – a stream of mercury. Above the swirling mullet, a pair of white -shouldered sea eagles swing into avoidance manoeuvres and bark at the friarbirds who mob them. Today around dusk I watched as a letter-winged kite hovered above the tide: stationed neatly in the air, it held this position for five minutes before deciding not to swoop.

## Vale Robert Adamson

17 • 5 • 1943 - 16 • 12 • 2022

Robert gathered up a life and let it go on the 16th of December 2022. This is the man of whom many said, 'Bob is the unofficial poet laureate of this country'.

You may have come upon *The Language of Oysters* - that consummate collection set to the music of black/white photos by Robert's partner, Juno Gemes. Their book gives a rare glimpse of Hawkesbury life during the 1980/90s. Bob's grandparents lived at Mooney and from them he absorbed much, including his grandmother's words "If you die on the river, the prawns will eat you." Some of Bob's most heartfelt lines in The Language are sewn with their character and that of the river "... memory tracks its fragments, its thousand winds, shoals and creeks, collapsed shacks ... his face hardened in sun, hands moving in and out of water and his life." from *Green Prawn Map*.

"Gone for days, and way down the river – an old man? We sat around the Angler's Rest/ playing the jukebox: Slim Dusty/ saving us from talk. . . . " from *Mullet Run 1*.


In the beautifully prepared Peat Island Community Chapel, January 13, many people gathered for the Celebration of Robert's life. Conceived and brought together by Juno, with friends, musicians, poets, publishers - this event became a good-humoured symphonic resonance of distinctive voices speaking to Robert's remarkable lifetime achievements — one of whom said, ". . . few other poets in Australia have rooted their poetics in place as he has done on the Hawkesbury."

Perhaps each of us in our own way absorbs and learns the place poetry of this river. You can learn a lot from Robert.

They named me Michael Finbar though secretly I thought. I truly was the product of a hated royal court.


The green of blessed Ireland ran coursing through my veins. Yet the drums and fifes of Orangemen haughtingly left strains.

### Hello Possums

If you have a resident possum in your garden and wish to provide a refuge for it, here's how you can build your own or order a specially designed home for either Ringtail or Brushtail possums.

For making your own possum nest, a volunteer at Sydney Wildlife Rescue gave the following advice how to simulate a nest or drey that Ringtail possums build from leaves in trees. "To assist providing them a home we tend to use 2 hanging



baskets joined together, filled with coconut fibre or the like and allowing a hole where the possum goes in and out." Position and secure the homemade nest in the fork of a tree where a possum can access it. The nest needs to be high above the

ground with a network of branches around, so the possum can move through the canopy and avoid going on the ground.

# What do you need to join the Community First Responders 33rd team?

Be of able body and mind.

We must all have a Police Check, a Working With Children Check and be fully vaccinated.

### What training is involved?

Induction training course, then monthly online modules (1h) and in person (3h), annual recertification in advanced resuscitation (1d).

#### What do you get?

A Certificate II Medical Services First Response, thorough maintenance of skills in advanced first aid, satisfaction of working in a team widely appreciated for its important community role. NSW Ambulance provides all uniforms, equipment and training.

#### How we operate?

When Ambulance receives a 000 call from the island, our team is alerted at the same time. We use the Signal messaging app to contact all qualified first responders and those members who are able to help reply.

A team of 2-3 people is assembled to attend each call-out, administer first-aid, liaise with the police boat and ambulance to get paramedics to



the patient ASAP, and help with extrication of the patient.

Do not be deterred if you work away from the island! We no

longer work roster shifts, and noone is obliged to stay home! The more residents we have who are trained to this level of first aid, the safer our community will be.

## Automatic External Defibrilator - AED

If you missed our recent community event introducing the NEW unit in the ferry shed, our take home message was, "the biggest single thing that will save the life of a patient in cardiac arrest is a fast response".

#### Prioritise...

**Person 1:** "Get on the chest" Start pumping blood, because their heart's not doing it.


**Person 2:** "Call 000" and tell them where you are and what's happening – the ambulance and Dangar's CFR team will both get on their way to you.

**Person 3:** "Defibrillate" Get the closest\*\* AED, and follow the instructions.

Keep going till the CFR team arrives to take-over.



\*\*AEDs can be found in the Ferry shed, and Bowling Club. They are also available to volunteers in the Fire Brigade and CFR.





### Top Tips from Ben Pigneguy

Collision avoidance responses

A right of way vessel (a boat you have to give way to) must maintain course and speed till they get past a give way vessel. The give way vessel can't turn to port until it has passed but can alter course to the right (starboard)

A right of way vessel is one that you generally see it's port (left) side, or stern. Think of nav lights at night, if you see a red (port) light or a white light (stern) you are the give way vessel and have to give way. If you see a green (starboard) light they have to give way.

Overtaking a vessel from behind can be done either side, but if you are doing more than 4 knots you have to pass at least 30m in front. Just think if you passed in front of a ferry and ran out of fuel...




