Here's where things stand.

The Never Ending Story: The McKell Park Cliffhanger (Season 12, Episode 26) (Action - Terry Stewart & Stephen Boyle)

We're grateful for the pro bono assistance and we'll name names when the curtain finally falls. Stay tuned — this one's got more episodes but we're hoping it will be the final season. Maybe somebody can work up a script and a score for a season next year at the Bowlo: "Parking: the Musical".

Road Warriors: Bronek's Mission Impossible (Action - Bronek Karcz)

Bronek has been relentless in pushing for better roads. Council has been responsive and we've thanked them formally. You may have spotted fresh guttering where blockages once reigned, grading and surfacing. There's more to do, but Bronek has determination in spades.

Hall Hire Heist: The Case of the Changing Code (Action - Peter Godbolt)

In a move worthy of a spy thriller, Council recently changed the community hall's access code without warning. This has strengthened our resolve to sort it out but it's never straight-forward. Our proposal is to take out public liability insurance and arrange a sole-hirer agreement so locals can book the hall without jumping through bureaucratic hoops. There are reasons given to us why this cannot be done (none

Our membership register is being updated, with friendly reminders to those with lapsed memberships. Membership keeps the League running and ensures this newsletter reaches you.

Ferry Tales: Opal has arrived

Years of effort have paid off: Opal is now available for the ferry—big thanks to Rick Stockley of Brooklyn Ferry Service. This will make it easier for residents (especially families) and draw more visitors who help keep the Bowlo, Depot and other services alive. Congratulations also to Rick on being awarded a new eight-year contract to operate the route.

A tender has also closed to redevelop the Brooklyn ferry wharf and improve accessibility. At the time of writing, the contract award is still pending.

Reactivating our Community Hall

We have made steady progress recently, and there's quite a lot of information to digest! Firstly, the council some weeks ago reduced the booking fees for the Dangar Hall to a flat rate of \$11 per hour, with a minimum 2 hour booking, with each individual booking attracting an \$18 fee whether it's for a long series, or a one off. This is quite a significant reduction, which may help support commercial and private use of the hall - do consider it if you're feeling inspired!

Insurance may be required for commercial and private bookings, and in addition, if you want to use the space after 5pm on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday, there is a \$500 bond payable, the administration of which lies with the council - get in touch with council for all further details!

From a League perspective, we have recently acquired public liability insurance through the folks at Local Community Insurance - this is something we've been strongly advised we need for any of our meetings and activities, as well as it being a requirement from the council if we wish to book the hall. Acquiring the insurance has therefore opened up the possibility of the League being able to book

the hall for community based initiatives, 3 such activities being Warbling, Bridge, and kids music. We have gone ahead and booked 5 sessions for these activities, as a pilot, which I view as a great step forward in officially 'reactivating' the hall for community use!

This means that the hall doors will, for the first time in many years, be opened regularly, and officially, to community led activities, on each Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Please feel welcome to wander by, take a look, and join in the activities if you'd like! In the first instance this is through a \$370 grant from the league, with the prospect of 'fee relief' from council, and/or contributions from the three groups and donations being pursued to offset costs

My longer term aim is to create a kitty which will allow the League to help facilitate both the fundraising for, and the actual activity of all sorts of community initiatives. The public league meetings are the best place to come and share any and all ideas you might have - now's the time to pop along, join up, and speak up!

Random mentions of our island in newspapers

ROSEMARY CURTIS, DIHS


Mullet Island was the name given to the island in 1788 by Captain Arthur Phillip. The island is referred to as Mullet Island or Dangar's Island or Dangar Island from the 1860s to 1890s in art works, newspaper articles, advertisements and official documents.

Two years after the island was purchased by Henry Cary Dangar in 1864, the following notice appeared in *The Empire* on 4 May 1866, a newspaper founded by Henry Parkes and published in Sydney from 1850 to 1875.

WATER POLICE COURT — THURSDAY

(Before the Water Police Magistrate and Mr. S. H. Pearce.)

Job Williams and David Ingram, alias 'The Stranger', charged with being engaged in a prize fight on Mullet Island, were committed to take their trial at the next Quarter Sessions.

Prize-fighting was illegal in Australia for much of the nineteenth century. The same two fighters were arrested and fined (amounts between £5–£10) around this period in other locations including Quakers Hill, near Blacktown.

Eight years later, 31 March 1874, the following notice appeared in *The Sydney Morning Herald*. Joseph Burns, the writer of the notice, was Henry Cary Dangar's second caretaker.

LOST AND FOUND

STRAYED on to Mullet Island, Hawkesbury River, a Bay HORSE, branded IW off shoulder, white face, short tail; if not claimed within 21 days will be sold to pay expenses.

Then on 21 October 1950 an article from *The Dubbo Liberal* and *Macquarie Advocate* only briefly mentions the island, but it is indicative of what newspapers covered in those days. Now it would possibly be posted on Facebook.

It introduces the impressive Mrs Laughton, who did not allow oyster cuts to stop her getting home in time for the monthly Buninyong meeting.

FAREWELL GIFT PUT TO VERY GOOD USE

A first aid kit presented to a former Dubbo man before he left the district several months ago was used for the first time last week on a Dubbo woman visitor to Sydney.

The kit was presented to Mr. V. C. Lark, for many years an active member of the Dubbo Ambulance Committee before he went to live in retirement at Dangar Island, on the Hawkesbury River, earlier this year.


Holidaying with the Lark family last week, Mrs. J. E. Laughton, Secretary of the Buninyong Agricultural Bureau, slipped on some rocks at Dangar Island and gashed her right arm on some oyster shells.

As a bush woman of considerable experience, Mrs.
Laughton was able to apply pressure to the artery and stop the flow of blood until she reached the house where Mr. and Mrs. Lark used the presentation first aid kit to bandage the wound.

As the wound required medical attention Mrs. Laughton cut short her holiday and went to Sydney, where eight pieces of oyster shell were extracted from her arm.

Mrs. Laughton then set out for home. 'I wanted to get back for the monthly Buninyong meeting,' she explained. 'I had the books, and they knew that I wouldn't let them down.'

Arriving at Orange, where she had left her car, Mrs.
Laughton attended an Agricultural Conference on
Wednesday and then set out alone for Dubbo. Arriving
in Dubbo on Wednesday night, she went straight to the
Ambulance Station for further treatment to her arm. Since
then she has been attended by a doctor and given anti-

ACKNOWLEDGING OUR FATHERS

Late night scanning again! I was prompted to write this up to add to my family history site with some photos of my Dad, an Army veteran of 21 years service, who died in 2016. We were not all there in theatres of war. We cannot fully appreciate what Service men and women go through to ensure we have the freedoms and the wonderful country we have

and the wonderful country we have today.

Yes, I know, John Denver, but his lyrics (link QR) were with a copy of the 2012 Bribie Island RSL Dawn Service, attended by my Dad, Lloyd Nicholls, a WO2 Engineer veteran of the Malayan Emergency, and Borneo campaigns. He was awarded a British Empire Medal for his service in Malaya. Denver's sentimental lyrics prompted me to remember my Dad, who loved his job and, as a Queensland country boy, especially loved his country.

Later, when we lived in Perth, I remember occasionally welcoming Aboriginal servicemen to our home; to us kids they were simply his friends who were missing their families.

Dad's grandfather was a teamster who hauled timber in the Yandina area, and his grandmother, a German immigrant, came with her family for a better life in Australia. He told me they raised him, and it was working with bullock teams as a youngster that led him to "run away" and join the Army.

Sadly, Dad never knew of his great-grandfather, a veteran of the Second Anglo-Afghan War, or his great-grandmother who followed across India with babes in arms, from Kolkata (formerly Calcutta, Bengal) to Agra. They came to Australia too, settling in Queensland for a life of farming. Later, three sons volunteered to fight

for Australia in WWI. The youngest is buried in France; another survived the trenches but never really recovered; and their third, an older son in his late forties, fronted for training but did not meet health standards. He may have had TB. Or indeed perhaps, suffered from the shame of being rejected.

One way or another, we all have connections; roots firmly implanted in this country. Even a balladeer like John Denver had a strong sense of it, though he was a "septic tank"! (For the younger set, that's

rhyming slang for Yank.) "And if we stand divided, divided we shall fall. But if we stand together, we shall conquer all."

Enjoy Sing Australia: and remember the contributions all our fathers have made.

The 2025-26 fire season officially starts on October 1st. We encourage all islanders to prepare their homes.

Have at least one to two metres cleared area around your home. Trim trees and shrubs that are next to or overhanging your home. Clear all leaf litter & debris from under and around your home, including roof and gutters. Remove flammable materials from around the home (gas bottles, chemicals, petrol, etc)

We all leave the green bin empty some weeks, but over the course of the year, green bins allow for the removal of approximately six cubic metres of green waste per household. This is in addition to the annual three cubic metres allowed for bulky green waste kerbside allocation. Next pick-up scheduled for 19/11/2025 so put it in your diaries and on the kerb.

Removing debris from close to your house and storing in a compressed pile reduces its ability to burn quickly due to lowered oxygen and higher moisture content. It can be used as garden mulch, or as a quick way to fill the green bin and make sure you are making the full use of your nine cubic metres annually!

If you have garden waste you would like to turn into valuable compost, Council provides a bulk green waste kerbside collection once a year

- ✓ Place green waste on the nature strip at the front of your property the weekend before your collection.
- ✓ Unacceptable items will not be collected and must be returned to your property.
- ✓ There is a strict 3 cubic metre size limit (3m x 1m x 1m). Over

Are We Sleepwalking Off a Cliff?

The Island is a wonderful place; the trees, birds, simplicity, no cars or pedestrian crossings, and with enough social backup services to suit our needs, such as the Fire Brigade, Community First Responders, the Buggy, Bowling Club etc

But we too face the impacts of international issues—population growth, tourism, climate change etc. In dealing with these, I don't think we expect to be a NIMBY community, but equally we don't want erosion of the very reasons that brought us here, and draw others in.

I think we would be advantaged by addressing this challenge.

The topics I would like to see calmly discussed are housing and

population needs, both permanent residential and recreational, building codes, environmental issues, tree coverage, bushfires, flora & fauna, and I am sure there are others.

These are generally covered by the Council zoning and the relevant building code for the Island.

Most of Sydney is zoned Residential.

Dangar Island is zoned Environmental Conservation.

This zoning is very different it permits quite different development for the Island. Consequently, short-term rentals, unless hosted, granny flats and dual occupancies are currently prohibited on the Island.

We are also covered by Council's

separate current planning code for the Island, covering site coverage, boundary setbacks, heights and boatsheds, which are stipulated for storage for boats not people.

Yet non-compliance on the island is what is happening. Regardless of compliance, it does signal to policy makers what our community will tolerate, so we should, as a community, be resolving this.

Council's enforcement of these rules is, admittedly, lax. But understandably, they're not alone; most councils are underfunded and constrained by rate caps.

Part of such a discussion ideally would include proposals to take us forward. There is provision for modifying the planning codes, through Council, to make this happen.

Firstly though, they would want community support, thus this epistle.

HELP!

Where is the nearest Defibrillator (AED)?

On Dangar we have 3 accessible Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs): in the ferry shed, on the Bowlo veranda, and near the south-western tip of the island at 122 Riverview. There is a green AED sign on the lamppost outside 122 Riverview ... look for it on your next walk. The AED itself is undercover by the front door of the house.

In Brooklyn there are several public AEDs at: Fenwicks Marina, Brooklyn Central, Anglers Rest, Brooklyn Corner, Fitzies Fish and Chips, Lifeboat Seafood and King Tide Café.

Defibrillation must only be used on a patient who is in cardiac arrest. That is, the person is unconscious and is not breathing.

If you witness a cardiac arrest follow the instructions in the NSW Ambulance CPR chart (refer image). Call 000 for help, commence chest compressions as soon as possible, direct another person to get the nearest AED, attach the AED to the patient, turn it on and follow the prompts until a CFR or paramedic arrives. Modern practice is that you do not have to give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

If you are confident about your CPR skills, please consider becoming a GoodSam volunteer. GoodSam Volunteers receive alerts via an app when help is needed in nearby CPR emergencies. Check the program out at www.ambulance.nsw.gov.au/goodsam

AT THE BOWLO

At the time of writing, the Bowlo is shut for winter maintenance while Sharon and Steve take a well-earned break. The June 2025 financial year is wrapped – and what a year it's been.

After the October AGM, the new Board had to tackle mounting losses, a challenge many in hospitality face. We held kitchen prices despite soaring food costs but increased bar prices where margins had shrunk over recent years. We cut admin costs, boosted volunteer help, tightened stock control, and found other efficiencies.

Events have evolved – from film afternoons to a wider mix of music including Jazz on the Verandah (a local favourite) and twilight bowls – for locals and visitors alike. The result? A small profit, only the second time in ten years (excluding one-off grants and donations). That's allowed us to buy new outdoor furniture, replace aging gear, and step up maintenance – all helped by Brett and the team's volunteer hours.

This turnaround comes down to hard work, volunteers, and your support. Margins remain tight, so every visit matters. Being a paid-up member helps too – with members' nights, discounts, and more to come when we're on a firmer financial footing.

Weed of concern – Spanish moss

We are increasingly alarmed at the impacts of Spanish Moss (*Tillandsia usneoides*) on the island. Known as old man's beard, it is often seen as a harmless ornamental plant and is spread by humans. This air plant is listed as a weed by NSW WeedWise as it is spread by birds, possums and wind, then smothers trees. Once established, is extremely difficult and costly to remove.

Community based environmental organisations Greater Sydney Landcare and STEP, have commenced a campaign to raise awareness of this weed and the risks it poses, and to urge residents to act. They say "Never buy, or actively spread this plant. If you have it on your land, try to eradicate it if possible (by composting or putting in your green bin), and encourage your neighbours to do the same." 

Thank you EVERYONE who contributed prizes, bought raffle tickets and supported our popups throughout the first half of the year. And to all our incredible stall holders, thank you one and all for turning up once again! We know it's not always easy, you all have busy lives and lugging trestles & items to sell is a real effort. We really appreciate you all as well as the brilliant musicians for making the market hum on the day - you guys are simply the best! It was an amazing event and all that scoffing of pastries has given a boost not only to waistlines but DiG's bank balance, allowing for the recent purchase of materials for our next big garden project: fencing the central island garden. CLOTH WORKSHOP

We have a unique opportunity to bring Cloth founder Julie Paterson to Dangar Island to run one of her amazing printmaking workshops.

Julie is a unique creative in the world of Australian printmaking and design. Her beautiful designs draw inspiration from the Australian landscape. With her ethos of locally sourced and sustainable materials. the Blue Mountains-based artist and designer said, "continuing the tradition of hand-printed flatbed fabric production is more important than ever, in this increasingly digital world. I started Cloth almost 30 years ago. Today my designs continue to be inspired by the Australian landscape and printed in small batches by hand in a tin shed"



We're planning a collaborative workshop for anyone wanting to cultivate creativity, confidence, calm and connection. It involves slowing down, getting into a lovely flow state, and making something beautiful about our environment.

How it works:

After booking into the project, Julie will guide us to do no-stress, loose and gestural, feel-good drawings. You don't need to be 'good at drawing.' Collectively, everyone's imperfections are what make each collaboration beautiful.

Using everyone's drawings, Julie will spend a week on island making cut paper stencils and printing onto a length of fabric to create a unique large-scale artwork.

Next, Julie will cut the fabric into pieces and give each participant their very own piece - making sure it includes the motif made from their drawing - to then embellish with slow-stitching.

You don't need to know how to do fancy embroidery techniques. Your stitching can be rough and ready, and it's the rawness they lend to the fabric that is so appealing.






