Car Parking In Brooklyn

League general meeting on Sunday 25 June for Brooklyn Parking issues.

As I am sure you are aware Hornsby Shire Council is determined to re-organise parking in Brooklyn by extending the 4 hour restriction across the entire triangle parking area near the public wharf and along the water side of lower McKell Park between the Marina and the Mooring Co-op. Essentially our representations to

Council so far have been unsuccessful and we are obviously concerned about what they will do in the next phase.

The League is looking at a number of responses to the parking plan and to council's sham consultation process, including calling in the Minister for local government, and meeting with local MP Matt Kean and Council's place-making team. We need the community behind us so we can represent your views. That means we all need to talk. So please attend the general meeting in the hall: 2pm, Sunday 25 June.

Beekeeper's Lament

I guess there are some who would say European Honey Bees are not native and shouldn't be in Australia. So might we say 95% of us are not native and shouldn't be in Australia. The loss of our hives on the island is for us beekeepers a devastating blow. I did not keep bees for their pollinating ability or for their honey, although both willingly accepted. I kept them for 60 years, with a couple of small breaks, as you might keep a dog or cat. And I feel so alone going into the garden in the morning seeing no stream of bees coming and going from the hives, hearing no buzzing, not being able to watch them get

excited around the Salvia or Bush Basil, not hear or see them around the tree at the shop, or other flowering trees on the island.

Each hive was different and over time changed depending upon the queen. Sometimes the bees became very aggressive and covering up was essential before a new queen was acquired. My last two hives were the gentlest I can remember having, and although I always wore a net for head protection I could work the hive otherwise without protective gear, making sure there was no disease; that small Hive Beetle was being controlled; and that the bees had a good foundation to work. Not one bee would sting, although occasionally they would knock my hand as if to say enough is enough.

My only hope is that they weren't "euthanised" in vain and that the Varroa Mite will be eradicated, although I am not optimistic. If this eradication programme is successful it will only be until next time, such is the reality of a shrinking world and increasing trade. It will be another problem which will need to be managed.





Plight of the Pollinators

The spread of the Varroa mite amongst European Honey bees in Australia didn't take long to affect Dangar Island since this pest was discovered in Newcastle in 2022. The Varroa mite kills the European honey bee and has the potential to kill Native bees which are important pollinators for our crops and indigenous plants.

Our island bee keepers who have kept the island sweet over the years with their jars of honey had to make the ultimate sacrifice to help prevent the spread of this pest by surrendering their hives. Hundreds of bee colonies in NSW have had to be destroyed to help prevent the spread of this mite.

Help with the pollination of our island vege gardens and indigenous plants by:

Avoid using pesticides that can kill native bees and other insect pollinators.

Making a bee 'hotel' for local species of solitary bees. Go to https://www.abc.net.au/gardening/how-to/bee-hotel/9440586

Leave some ground unmown and undisturbed for burrowing bees like the Blue Banded bee.

Grow plants in clumps so they flower in groups. Bees especially like blue flowers and a diversity of colours.

Grow Plants that are local to Dangar Island. Eucalypts, Banksias, Wattles, Hardenbergia, Native Bluebell, Christmas Bush, and many more, attract native bees and other insect pollinators like beetles, wasps, flys, butterflies, moths and ants. Dry, hot summer on the horizon

The latest long range weather reports indicate that the Australian east coast is heading back into an El Niño climatic cycle. Whilst not a bad thing for those seeking a more

stereo-typical Sydney summer than we have seen for the last few years, the drier, hotter weather obviously increases the risk of fire hazard.

Winter is a great time to start the process, I write, looking out over my own neglected garden!

Removing debris from close to your house and storing in a compressed pile reduces its ability to burn quickly due to lowered oxygen and higher moisture content. It can be used as garden mulch, or as a quick way to fill the fortnightly green bin.

For larger 'bulk green waste' Hornsby council offers an annual kerbside pick-up of 3 cubic metres for pruning and waste that do not fit in your green bin (2023 dates to be confirmed, but generally in Oct/Nov).

While pile burns are also an option for Dangar residents due to our C4 Environmental Living zoning we would always encourage the use of the green waste collection first where possible in order to reduce the impact on island air quality.

An application to burn is required year-round and can be submitted

online at the council's website by following the QR code below. When performing a pile burn always remember that approval is for burning dead and dry vegetation only.

Burning of rubbish, plastics, building materials, cardboard, grass clippings, and green, wet, painted, or treated timber is strictly prohibited due to impacts on air quality.

When undertaking a pile burn outside of fire season you should also:

- Advise your immediate neighbours 24hrs in advance.
- Ensure that the fire is monitored at all times.
- Have a water source readily available.
- Only burn if weather conditions are favourable.


Aim: This flyer seeks to determine the level of interest among Hawkesbury River residents to participate in the creation of independently funded parking arrangements in Brooklyn. This initiative will concentrate on possible vehicle parking and commuter boat berthing opportunities on the Rail Causeway and/or in Parsley Bay.

Background: At a general meeting of the Hornsby Shire Council on 12 April 2023, the Council resolved unanimously to introduce extensive 4 hour timed parking arrangements in Brooklyn. This unfortunately will considerably affect all river residents who drive a vehicle. Overall there will be 40 fewer unrestricted parking spaces available in Brooklyn, and of the 142 parking spots around the marina waterfront, only 43 will remain for unrestricted parking.

Interested river residents are requested to register via email r.toman@optusnet.com.au Depending on the level of interest, a meeting will be held at the Dangar Island Community Hall soon.

It is hoped the meeting will formulate a plausible action plan and timetable that will future proof some dedicated parking arrangements for Hawkesbury River residents.

Mobility Permit

I know, from personal conversations, that many die-hards in our community have not put in an application for the disability permit that they deserve. I admire you, I do, but I'm asking you to change.

For those without mobility permits, our Brooklyn home-parking could, in all probability by October, require a walk, to Upper McKell, which is approx. 150m and has a grade four times steeper than the disability code limit, with no landing breaks. Or maybe you'll take the steps ... a lot of them, uneven, with no hand-rail.

With your interest – and that of NSW Ambulance – at heart, I want you to be able to reach your car safely, even at times when the weather, or your own personal fitness, is not at its best.

Mobility permit holders can park for an unlimited time in timed parking zones, providing the permit is on display, and the parking inspector can read it. Council has justified the implementation of 4-hour parking on grounds that it will be easier for permit holders to park. If you are eligible, take them up on that, and please leave the few unrestricted spots to those who do not have a permit.

Are your flu vaccinations up to date?

It's free for those aged under 5 or over 65, and recommended for women at any stage of pregnancy. Ask your GP or go to: https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/pages/flu.aspx

You can get your free COVID booster at the same time as your flu jab, available at pharmacies and your GP. It's recommended for those over 18 with more than 6 months since last COVID vaccination. To get a PCR test you now need a pathology referral from your doctor. https://www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19

With the chill and wood-smoke in the air, there is an increased risk of asthma. If you have an asthma management plan, this is a good time to review it and ensure you have a sufficient supply of the medications you use.

If you or someone else in your household has trouble breathing, call 000. NSW Ambulance paramedics will be dispatched, and two or three Dangar CFRs will soon be at your location to help until the paramedics arrive. In our kit (pictured) we have Ventolin puffers to relieve a mild asthma attack (little daggers in your chest), nebulisers and oxygen for moderate attacks (can't get a whole sentence out, feeling scared), and we are trained in life-saving expiratory assistance if the attack is severe.

But don't let it get to that ... Stay safe and well this winter.

Native Plant Profile: Glycine clandestina

It's always such a joy to come across *Glycine clandestina* in the bush, especially when it's in flower. Flowering occurs predominantly in winter and spring, though you can find sprinklings of its pale pink - mauve flowers throughout the year. Its common names are Twining Glycine or, more endearingly, Love Creeper.




It has a large natural range, thriving in every state along the east coast of Australia, from Cape York to Tasmania. And accordingly, it is able to survive in a range of different habitats, from coastal zones to subalpine regions.

Interestingly, *Glycine* is actually the soybean (or soya bean) genus within the bean family Fabaceae. The most well known member of this genus is *Glycine max*, which you might be most familiar with from the edamame beans at a Japanese restaurant. Edamame's species name comes from the Latin 'Maximus' meaning 'the greatest,' whereas by contrast Love Creeper's species name *clandestina* comes from the Latin 'clandestinus' meaning hidden and secretive.

And it is a rather clandestine creeper, with narrow wiry stems twining around other plants for support, but never really overwhelming them. It's a polite and surreptitious little guest.

So how to find it? Its main identifiable feature is its leaves, which are trifoliolate. This means they're divided into three small leaflets which are proportionately long and narrow. These leaves occur alternately up the stem (rather than opposite each other). Flower stalks emerge from the creeper just above each leaf, and can each bear 4-18 tiny purplish pea flowers.

If a flower is fertilised, a tiny little bean-shaped fruit will follow, containing 4-12 seeds. But unlike edamame, definitely do not eat them!

so we thought it fair to flag them here. Also watch out for a key foreign spelling - we use Australian spelling here, so any other spellings are part of the game.


