INVASION DAY 2010: THREE'S A CROWD...

of Dangar completely aghast as an estimated 1,200 visitors swamped our shores, swelling the population to approximately 1,500. The councilfunded venture to open our doors to the general public soon ballooned into an enterprise of mammoth proportions, leaving many wondering if it was the largest crowd ever assembled here. A quick search through the island's with 3 previous events challenging for the honour.

Firstly, the opening of the original railway bridge on May 1st 1889 saw a very large number of visitors to the island for the official banquet on the huge pontoon moored alongside the public wharf (photo below). The Sydney Morning Herald the next day reported 2 trains carrying 700 guests from Sydney, and another with 100 from Newcastle arrived in Brooklyn, with 3 steamers ferrying them to Dangar Island. With the 450 odd workmen living here at the time, plus the press and other onlookers, the numbers may have nudged 1,500 but there is no official record of the total.

Another Australia Day, this time 1988, saw the Bicentennial celebrations on the island, with the re-enactment of Governor Phillip's arrival here, tall ships on the river and across at Parsley Bay, a rock concert featuring Jon Stevens. Again, there

Australia Day 2010 left the residents are no official crowd estimates but long-term residents assure me there were at least 1,000 visitors, so along with the residents the total of 1,500 may have been reached.

But the largest crowd was reached on November 12th 1984 when a record number of 1,660 competitors from 415 boats lined up on Bradley's Beach for the start of the Bridge To Bridge. When you add support crews, family, history has led me to believe it wasn't, friends and the island residents there would have been close to 2,000 people on Dangar that morning! Pedants may argue that not all racers would have been standing on land at the same time, or that only land above the high tide mark can be counted as the island, but surely the total number to stand on Dangar that day was a record.

> The largest number of overnight visitors would probably have been during the mid 1970s on the eve of the Bridge To Bridge race. In those days race competitors would camp here overnight, with tents stretching the length of Grantham Crescent (when it was ALL grass!) and also in the park next to the bowling green. The Saturday night was always a rowdy affair with lots of alcohol consumed, and some very "tired and emotional" racers jumping into boats the next morning. Aaah, the good ol' days breathalysers...

NEW FIRE DANGER RATINGS AND WARNINGS

You will have seen in the media and on signs elsewhere the new national fire danger rating system. The new system includes the rating "Catastrophic". This additional rating divides the fire danger index into three significant sections rather than the previous two. Essentially the "Severe", "Extreme" and "Catastrophic" ratings provide you with more information than the previous ratings in that you can readily discern the escalating scale of fire danger.

It should be stressed that what the ratings are communicating is the likely fire behaviour that will ensue in case of an out break of fire under the predicted conditions, and not simply the "chance" of a fire occurring.

The fire threat on the Island remains as it has always been and we continue to rely heavily on the goodwill of Islanders to "do the right thing" both in terms of preparing your property well ahead of the fire season and to act responsibly once the fire danger ratings approach "High".

The Island and our surrounds have gotten through this fire season with only minor fires in our vicinity. The recent rains have been a welcome relief to our gardens and the Island generally but it will result in increased growth which in turn will lead to increased fuel levels when summer returns later in the year. Please ensure that you keep fuel levels under control and that you are ready for the next fire season starting on 1st October, 2010.

Your brigade is certainly preparing for the season already. Shortly we will be distributing to every house a fire checklist that is simple to fill out and we will be asking that you return it to us as quickly as possible. The information that you provide will then add to our data already collected and will form the basis of the DI bush fire risk management plan. Our plan will then be a sub-set of the Hornsby/ Kuringai Plan. It is important that we have as comprehensive information as possible and again we will be relying on the common sense and goodwill of all Islanders. Thank you for supporting the Brigade and to all who worked to reduce their own fire risk, our heartfelt thanks and congratulations on a job well done.

As an aside, the fire boat has gone for its long-awaited refurbishment. Although it is the oldest boat in the Hornsby 'fleet' it is in generally good condition. It will be re-painted, repairs made to cabin and lockers and generally updated. It is expected to return in about 12 weeks. Until then we have the use of the Berowra Waters Boat 'Bravo'. Additions will soon be made to the fire pontoon fence, closing off the gap near the water, making it secure once again. We ask that you do not climb the fence or access the pontoon or tie your boat to the pontoon. To do so is not only dangerous, it is trespassing.





"The items will be dismantled and recycled to make new goods." said Council's Waste Education Officer, Amanda Watson.

E-waste includes: Cabling associated with electrical appliances Computers and peripherals

TVs, stereos, DVDs, CDs and VCR players Game consoles, faxes and phones Fans, toasters, microwaves, kettles and irons

There have been a few incidents recently of neighbours producing excessive amounts of noise into the wee hours. The last noisy-neighbour experience I had was after an Open Mic Night.

We live in a very quiet environment. Those coming from the city to enjoy our Island are used to a high level of background noise and do not realise that a person talking at a normal tone and volume carries across (I have often remarked that visitors from the city must bring their noise with them to be comfortable.) Most of us also do not have air conditioners; we keep our windows open at night to catch the breeze. Unfortunately, fly-screens do not screen noise as well.

If you are annoyed by the noise of holiday makers in short-term rental properties on the island, use: 24/7 Holiday Complaint Hotline; Call Kevin 9985 8115.

If you are annoyed by a property owner the advice offered on the many government

- 1) talk to your neighbour
- call the Police Assistance Line on 131 444 - "you will need to tell the operator the exact location where the noise is coming from and describe the type of noise."

The legislation states that "quiet-time" is from 10PM to 8AM weekdays (Sun -Thurs) and midnight to 8AM on weekends

The legislation explicitly states:

33 Use of sound systems on vessels

A person must not cause or permit any musical instrument or sound system to be used on a vessel in such a manner that it emits offensive noise.

- 51 Musical instruments and sound equipment
- (1) A person must not cause or permit any musical instrument or electrically amplified sound equipment to be used on residential premises in such a manner that it emits noise that can be heard within a habitable room in any other residential premises (regardless of whether any door or window to that room is open):
- (a) before 8 am and after midnight on any Friday, Saturday or day immediately before a public holiday, or

(b) before 8 am and after 10 pm on any other day.
