Firstly, I want to thank Brenda for all her assistance in running the league over the past five years. It has been an

outstanding contribution to our community.

As I write this, the parking issue is far from resolved, and it appears it will continue for some time yet, while council assesses the next steps. That means we need to continue to document, make notes, and take time stamped photographs around what does and doesn't work in the council's plan.

We need to ensure what we report is factual, accurate and even-tempered. Exaggerations and slurs will not help us. Some of the councillors are already supportive and we need their support. We can win over more councillors if we remain civil and honest.

We'll keep pushing for resident permits and paid parking that has longer time limits. Funds raised would help with future parking infrastructure.

We'll continue to be proactive, and engage all the river communities. Please stay tuned as we progress this discussion and ask for your input and support for an agreed strategy. Pending a long term, viable solution, our immediate focus is on permits to alleviate the impact of the timed parking.

More campaign opportunities are coming up, before which we'll have meetings to discuss next steps.

For two years the living world has had a voice on the Dangar Island League's committee. I have been honoured to have this role in representing the interests of island wildlife. Having someone specifically represent the interests of Dangar Island's ecology has helped to raise awareness and focus attention on its unique wonders, its needs, and create activities in the interests of our natural world.

Over the two years there has been a walk and talk with tree scientists about trees on the island. There have been street plantings with local seedlings to create cooler roads, wind breaks, food and habitat for the future. The needs of island wildlife has been publicised with signage about Mareela Reef and a talk by the RSPCA on 'Keeping Cats Safe at Home'. Beach erosion activated the planting of local grasses and seedlings along Bradleys Beach. Island wildlife has been promoted with the creation of environmental and citizen science pages on the

In late October, a flock of almost 50 Cattle Egret swooped as one, over Mareela Reef. It was a spectacular sight. They circled, dipped low, circled again lower, and then very gracefully landed on the solitary mangrove on Mareela Reef. They spent the day there and when a gusty wind came up late afternoon, they carefully repositioned themselves

on the leeward side and rested there all night. Next morning, off they went in perfect formation.

When closely observed they are quite beautiful with fluffy orange-buff head plumes, a stripe on their back and a red bill.

I first saw one lone Cattle Egret here in 2020, then again in 2021, and in 2022 a flock of 14 arrived. Word is getting out that Mareela Reef is a safe and protected place to rest on their journey!

Estuary Action List

Tim Macdonald, Environment Strategy Manager, Hornsby Council

Six partner councils have been working together since 2018 to improve management of the Hawkesbury Nepean River System. In May 2023 the Councils received \$432,000 funding, under the New South Wales Coastal and Estuary Grants Program, towards the progression of a Coastal Management Program (CMP).

Over the next couple of months, partner Councils (Central Coast,

Northern Beaches, Hornsby, Kuring-gai, Hills and Hawkesbury) will be working with suitably qualified and competitively selected consultants to consolidate a long list of potential management actions to address the key threats facing the river system now and into the future. Once completed, these actions will be assessed for their feasibility and economic viability before being presented to community and government agencies for consideration during 2024.

This evaluation process will produce a concise list of priority management actions,

while confirming the roles and responsibilities (incl. financial) associated with each action. You can learn more about the CMP and subscribe to receive the news and updates on the progress and upcoming consultation opportunities via www.hawkesburynepeancmp.org or follow the QR below.







Congratulations to DIG for their first 5 years. The spaces around the Bowling Club Green have evolved into a fabulous productive community place.

We hope you reach the ripe old age of 30 one day, which is how long Bushcare has officially been going in Kiparra Reserve, with Council's support (unofficially we started a few years before Council began their program in 1993).

We quietly go about our bushland sessions removing invasive species like *Lantana*, *Ochna*, Asparagus and Fishbone Ferns, as well as *Ehrhata* grasses, that plague the island. During the early 70's, Bruce Lambert recalls the first time he went to look at his block of land on Riverview Ave, "access was through a track under a tunnel of *Lantana*".

Nowadays you will find the occasional seedling pop its head up, rarely getting a chance to reproduce seeds. The birds are constantly delivering weed-seedy packages from neighbouring gardens, so we keep going back to care for the bushland, on the

first Saturday morning of every month at 9am.

If you are interested in native gardens, joining us is a great way to learn what is locally native and what is invasive. We begin gathering below the access track at 149 Riverview Ave.

Occasionally I remember to post on our Dangar Island Bushcare facebook page. Please follow us there, and if we can help answer any bushland questions, we'd love to help. We also have some helpful information in our page on the League website.

Local heroes receive awards for bravery

Cain Bettenson and Rochman Reese were among 40 recipients of awards for bravery issued by the Royal Humane Society of NSW at a ceremony at Government House on 16 November 2023.

Cain (aka Tom the fisherman) and Rochman (aka Rocky) received bronze medals for their actions in responding to an explosion and fire on a motor cruiser that had been refuelling at the Marina at Brooklyn in April 2021.

Locals will remember the dramatic events of the day, when a large motor cruiser, skippered by a group of friends returning from an enjoyable day on the river, exploded into flame in the course of refuelling at Brooklyn marina.

While the occupants of the cruiser, a number of whom were badly burned, stumbled and ran from the vessel, Tom and Rocky, who were nearby at the time, ran toward the burning vessel, acutely aware of the risk that surrounding vessels, or even the

Yours Sincerely, RR fuel bowsers, might also catch fire and explode.


Working together and applying their boating skills and understanding of fuel fire, Tom and Rocky manoeuvred the burning cruiser away from the fuel pontoon and nearby vessels in Tom's tinnie. Tom attempted to douse the fire with the spray from his outboard prop, while Rocky used a fire extinguisher and coordinated efforts with the Brooklyn Fire Brigade. Together Tom and Rocky were able to push the cruiser up against a sea wall, away from the marina, where the Brooklyn fire truck crew eventually extinguished the blaze.

In awarding the bronze medals, Her Excellency Margaret Beasley, the NSW Governor, noted that Tom and Rocky, without hesitation, courageously exposed themselves to significant danger, thus averting what could have become a major disaster.

The end does come at last on the sixteenth day of fighting. One can but hope more care with the fire you are lighting.



Busy Start to Fire Season

Event support for the Bridge-to-Bridge race has seen the brigade close out an extremely busy spring kick-off to the fire season, with 4 major fire events affecting the bushland and communities around the river. In all instances these events were caused directly by human activities and required RFS air support and hundreds of man hours to extinguish and mop up. The root cause of these events ran the full gamut of risk behaviours relating to fire hazards, with unmonitored pile burns, campfires & barbeques, and the use of spark inducing power tools in, or close to, bushland.

The dramatic view we all had of Wobby ablaze is a timely reminder of the need for fire safety at all times but especially at this time of year.

No fires of any kind are permitted during total fire bans.

Actively monitor firepits, campfires and BBQs and ensure that you have a cleared area and a constant water supply at hand.

Be always mindful of weather conditions and do not light fires on days with high wind.

It is illegal in NSW National Parks to light a campfire (unless an official firepit is in place).

Be aware of your fire risk when using hot work tools such as grinders, brush cutters and welders.

Where possible use your green bin or store leaf litter in compressed piles to be used as garden mulch, rather than completing a pile burn.



If you are completing a pile burn ensure you have the appropriate approval from Council & the RFS (during fire season).



Top Tips from Randall Ferrington

Weather. One of the biggest contributors to safety issues on boats is the weather. Complacency when setting out for even a short trip can have serious consequences. While a check of the current forecast is the best way to go, just stopping and looking around you at the sky and or clouds, and noting the strength and direction of the wind, can be an early warning of changes that may have an effect on your safety on the water.

Look out. Keeping a good lookout on the water may sound simple, but whether you are in a tinny, kayak, skiff, cruiser, yacht or ferry, this simple, effective skill is very under rated. In my experience many close quarters situations and accidents would have been avoided by practising this essential skill on the water.

Bold Intentions. When steering a boat of any size or type, your skill at manoeuvring so as to make your intentions absolutely clear to all vessels around you will ensure there is no doubt what your intentions are, and will avoid unnecessary confusion.

Answers: 1C, 2A, 3D, 4B
