Background

In 2019 the Dangar Island League decided to run a community survey to help identify values, concerns and ideas within the community. The questions were kept open and non-specific so residents could choose their own topics and level of detail to share.

We knew collating the wide variety of results we received would require much time and teamwork to interpret and distil. Unfortunately, current conditions scuppered the meeting where we had planned to present our data in a chatty and interactive way. The Q & As would have helped clarify and evolve ideas and issues, many of which could or do influence each other. We are now forced to send this information forth for you to interpret in this non-communal way. However, when things settle and we are able to gather as a community again, we are hoping to have that interactive meeting.

The survey was distributed to the door and face to face wherever possible to encourage community participation.

Survey Response & Analysis

In a community of 198 residential dwellings, 117 unique surveys were returned.

Each survey was completed by any number of people in a household and some surveys contained multiple responses to one or more questions.

While analysing the surveys, similar concepts emerged which became the identifying categories, themes and comments used to consolidate responses, where appropriate.

Analysing the surveys was a complex task which at times required much discussion. All survey responses were analysed multiple times ensuring that comments had been addressed consistently and that all responses had been included in the results.

Throughout the process, importance was placed on consistency and equity: consistency in how one comment was handled in relation to others; and equity, fairness and impartiality across all comments on all surveys.

Given that not all households completed a survey, the results cannot be viewed as a representation of the whole community. Similarly, as each survey was completed by differing numbers of people, one comment does not necessarily represent a single person's view, or one whole household's view.

One of the most interesting elements of the survey findings lies in the relationships between the three categories of "community", "environment" and "access & services" across the 5 questions. Please refer to the tables and charts below and the larger spreadsheet for further insight into the survey findings and the correlations between categories, themes and comments.

The Next Steps

No doubt, some of you may wish to add more comments to your personal survey once other comments have been viewed (we all did). There will be further opportunities for engagement in discussions and decision-making as we progress through some of the topics raised.

As we feel you will understand, this survey was just that: a survey that felt the pulse of the island in both a quantitative and qualitative way. As such, it took a small team of people some hundreds of hours to process and collate in a very thoughtful and careful way.

We are not wanting to progress any of the new topics which came out of the survey just yet, because that would be premature. As stated above, we feel there is a need for a face to face meeting where, everyone who wants to, can have further input as well as comment on the process and the findings so far. However, the DIL committee continues to do the work of DIL with a clear sense of the things that need to be progressed and that are left over from the hard work of previous committees, or which come up in the normal course of life.

That having been said, there still remain, though, matters and concerns that you will see in the attached documents. Some matters are beyond the scope of the committee of DIL, some matters are complex, sometimes with views divided amongst islanders. It is these issues that we are trying to consider as well as to come up with a way or ways to achieve both consensus and solutions.

So far we have not come up with anything revolutionary, just tried and true methods that are being used by governments and bodies around the world. In lots of ways they look like the sub-committees that are the mainstay of any association as it tries to gather together people who have expertise and interest in particular things and whose work the main committee uses to help it make decisions.


In trying to make a choice about how to proceed we were very cognizant of the need for a number of things: that the smaller body be chosen from those who are willing but who also represent as many views and parts of the demographic present on the island as is possible; that the discussions that they have be ones that adhere to a good process and are fair; that there be expert and stakeholder opinions incorporated into those deliberations; and that the outcomes / solutions they propose be taken seriously and respected as the representative views of the whole island.


So far, we have found the model provided by Citizen Assemblies to be the one most suited to the needs of Dangar Island. It incorporates all the considerations above and it has been used around the world by nation states, states and smaller groupings of people to make decision making more democratic and representative. We will talk about all of these possibilities at greater length when we meet and imagine that whatever methodology is used it will be flexible enough to deal with our small population but make sure that as many people are involved in making the complicated decisions as is possible.


