That brings us to the Council's Implementation Workshop coming up Feb

We are plotting to get an Island Directory also up and running, more details later.

Lastly, the youth on the Island are revolting, which is to say, they are in revolt. They are actually part of the community but have no effective voice or influence over matters that affect them. We're looking into that too. A Junior League is coming.

In order to achieve these things, we need to have demonstrable support from the community. This simply means joining the League, (which is very cheap this week). Then we can maximise our influence with Council, as they will clearly be dealing with an Association which truly represents the Community. Also check the Calendar of meetings this issue if you would like to join and join in.

Mooring update

Regular readers will know that we are investigating options to obtain funding to improve commuter mooring and access to the Island near the public wharf ... so here is a brief note to let people know how we are progressing. We have made inquiries with the Department of Land and Water Conservation and confirmed that a community commuter facility is permitted in this area. We have also received advice from Waterways Funding Asset Development and Management Program that a facility which improves public access may be eligible for funding. Next we will be liaising with Hornsby Council as their support will be necessary to progress with an application for funding. We will also seek to have the Brooklyn Estuary Management Committee support the project. We may need your help as the project progresses so feel free to inquire and 'watch this space'.

GROWN YOUR OWN ON DI [PART 2]

The promised, but belated conclusion to this popular item:

4: RECORDS

As this is a relatively new venture for me - (First seeds planted Autumn 1999) I decided to keep quite detailed records of what I planted, when, and where and how it grew. These have proved most useful (back up with photographs) and I would strongly recommend anybody setting out to grow vegies to keep track of what they do - it's amazing how one forgets which part of the bed had the carrots two years ago! And if you are going to practice crop rotation, that's important.

5: SUCCESSES AND FAILURES

My best success so far is in the salad department. We have cut and come again lettuce of various sorts, all year round, plus endless supplies of 'rocket' and parsley.

I leave the most healthy plants to go to seed then collect these seeds for replanting (heirloom seeds have the best viability).

Peas and beans have been pretty good too. Tomatoes - variable - lots of 'yellow pears' but only one 'Black Russian'!

So far root vegies - particularly parsnip and potato have been huge failures - or rather, spectacularly small failures! But not withstanding that, it is great fun, and one only feels more determined to do better next year.

Jona plays with water

Dangar Islander Jonathan Sykes unveils revolutionary wastewater technology at his home in Neotsfield Ave.

"It's a low-tech, high return pollution solution, and a punch in the nose for the drought as well" says Jonathan who says that many island houses could copy him for as little as a hundred dollars, or even less using parts salvaged from throw-outs.

"I've got no plumbing expertise at all, says Jonathan, but I picked up bits and pieces of plastic pipe here and there because it looked kind of like Lego, and I thought how hard can it be?"

Using a toolkit of a hacksaw, two rags and a file, Jonathan installed the system in a day, and what's more designed in the capacity to revert to the old plumbing system in minutes.

"It's breathtakingly simple really," says Jonathan, "the shower and bathwater are diverted out the side of the house into a garden bed. The pipes sit on top of the soil, so roots won't grow in, but beneath a thick layer of mulch to avoid any grossness. The mulch improves the soil, inhibits evaporation and makes the soil surface soft and absorbent, so it can cope easily with big loads of water"

Jonathan has already planted banana trees to sop up his daily shower water, and plans to add custard apple and star fruit.

The Message:

"Call me up and let me show you how to turn wastewater into a free feed. Anyone can do this and our beautiful island environment will be the big winner. My number's 9985 8334"
