Unless you have a new model septic system, Envirocycle, Biocycle, etc., your septic will probably need pumping out.

What happens is that your septic tank is sized (or should have been) in capacity in using it. Therefore the capacity is critical for it to work - the bacteria and enzymes all chomping away formake it pure, slear water for your absorption trenches.

However over time, the tank gradually fill with non-organic matter - hair pins, plastic, coins but mostly sand and grit from people showering, dirty feet and from washing grubby clothes. This grit doesn't break down biologically and get pumped off to the trenches, it just accumulates in the bottom of the tank AND THIS REDUCES the capacity of the tank, which means the waste doesn't properly break down before going to the trenches which, in turn, means the trenches get trashed too.

Therefore the grit needs to be cleared out (generally every 5 to 7 years) and thus the...


If you're interested have a think about it and come along. Notices for the meeting will be posted as soon as we can agree on a date (that's the hard part).

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ISLAND PUMP OUT WAS BORN!

Likely to be on a weekend in May

- Likely to cost \$700 \$800 (???) -Prices will depend on how many sign up
- Need to be paid by cheque in advance per property and cheque handed over on completion
- Contractor has previously done Mackeral Beach and Scotland Island
- Lids will have to be unscrewed off fibreglass tanks prior to the pump out truck arriving (a small industry lurks here).

There is a list at the shop of about 24 houses so far – make sure your name is on it as it will cost you about double this to have it done as a one off job with barging, etc.

Council's current "licensing" arrangement for septics may well ask for this to be done in it's next round of licensing as the tank capacity is critical to its operation particularly since dishwashers and washing machines tend to overload old systems.

P.S The exception for the Envirocycle, etc systems is because they have to be certified annually through a maintenance contract – which costs \$350 or so per year. So \$700 +/- every 5 to 7 years isn't so bad

Blast from the Past

From the Dangar Island Historical Society's files

The following letter, from Bruce Stewart, was received by the DIHS in April 2001:

"Dear Sir – I have just received a copy of the Guide to Historic Dangar Island, sent to me by my brother who lives in Sydney, and I thought I would write about my recollections of living on the Island with my parents and five brothers and sisters. We lived there from approx 1943 to approx 1953. Those some of these stories may be of interest.

- Present shop was built on site (not shifted) by my father B.F. Stewart, approx 1948-1950.
- My father was the first Captain of the Fire Brigade, after he built the first fire station.
- He also built the house at the stone water tower (Tower House).
- The horse and cart was owned by Bill Mason (not Tom) and the horse's name was "Heather", a blue roan.
- The first vehicle was a truck owned by Mr Compton.
- My father, B.F. Stewart, built many houses after WWII on the island, including shop and house for Emanuel
- Kassimatis*, plus house opposite the shop, in which we lived.
- My father had the adjoining boatsheds and ran a boat hiring business, which I looked after when I was just a boy about 12 years old.
- Once during WWII the ferry boat was late coming back after the last train was delayed at Brooklyn. No boat was allowed on the water after 6pm. It was dark and as the ferry neared the Island wharf, the Army fired a shot across its bows – Mannie stood on the bow shouting "Don't shoot, it's the Dangar Island ferry." I think they fired again – Just for the sport!
- Another story which involved Mannie. One day he left the wharf to go the mainland with no passengers setting the boat on course, he proceeded to walk around the side with two cream cans in his hands. He fell into the water the boat proceeded to travel by itself, it reached the roadbridge before the river boat the "Surprise", skippered by Johnny Shakeshaft, came alongside. Johnny jumped aboard and stopped the motor Mannie swam ashore! (Note: There are a number of versions of this story in the DIHS files)
- My father built three houses for Noel Monkman, just up the hill from the store "Riverview", "Tower House" and one other. He also built for Mr & Mrs Schiebel on the beach. He did most of the work on Norm French's house, before he made the tennis courts.
- One family on the Island lived in a cave at the back of their block while the house

- One family on the Island lived in a cave at the back of their block while the house was built – their name was Steele.
- One of the Norfolk Island pines growing up through the boatshed near the wharf was
 hit by lightning, tearing a huge piece out of the middle. It fell down and just missed
 my Dad and me as we rushed to secure the boats. I later had to dig it out of the
 ground with a spade it was 3m long with 1m burled.
- My father worked on the "new" bridge as a leading hand in charge of building the superstructures. This occurred after he moved from the Island to live in Sydney. He worked on the bridge with Harold Deaves, a champion axeman, who lived in Brooklyn. In 1987, my father paintd a picture of the bridge being constructed. He donated it to the State Rail Authority.
- As a boy growing up on the Island and having access to boats from our boatshed, I used to row a boatload of kids to the pictures on a Saturday night in Brooklyn. I was only about 10-11 years old. At times the boat was very much loverloaded. Mannie was asked most Saturdays would he take us over, his standard reply was "Only if you get enough people to go and make it worth my while." Needless to say we never could make up the numbers as the oldies were not much interested in Hopalong Cassidy, etc.


I have a lot of very fond memories of Dangar Island, I learnt to swim, row a boat, catch fish, all about boats and spent some of the best times of my life there. I have been back a couple of times in the last 20 years, and hope to return in the not too distant future. I am compiling a list of the permanent residents who lived on the Island while we lived there.
